- Northern Siberia appears to have had a temperate climate capable of sustaining vast herds of grazing animals and large deciduous tree forests. It suddenly changed.
- Analyzes a shift of the tilt of the axis. If more vertical, the temperate zone would have been much wider north and south and include not only much of the arctic, but would have moved the world's great deserts into the temperate zone as well. A tilt of the axis would reverse these things.
- Ground penetrating radar shows Sahara once had rivers and supported cities and populations.
