OVER TIME, mankind has moved a long way past primitive, superstitious beliefs about the origins of life. Through centuries of study and science, we have gained a common understanding about the earliest natural origins of life in general that can be used to explain the particular origin of human life.

If there were an alternate scientific explanation about the origin of life, as a substitute for the theory of evolution, it would have been developed by now.

ON THE OTHER HAND, we still can't explain everything. Surely, attempts to give a definitive explanation about the origin of human life inescapably lead to some other questions for which there are no easy answers, such as: How did life actually start? How do we know when our environment will cease to support life? Does science shut out some other possibilities, that perhaps it ought to be more open to considering? More and more, the people are directed by powerful elitists to trust the conclusions of scientists, and to reorder their lives according to them. However, the elitist platitudes "In Science We Trust" and "Follow the Science" neglect the importance of qualitative distinctions about science, made from judging the level of confidence provided by different samples of scientific evidence.

RESOLVED: The Science of Evolution Is Settled.
